DID Policy 2014 - 2019 launched

The Disability Inclusive Development Policy 2014-2019 was launched on the 13th of October 2015 by the Hon. Minister of the Ministry of the Internal Affairs, & Minister for Disability, Albert Nicholas, during the Pacific Disability Rights framework & Inclusive Education Consultation at the University of the South Pacific.

The Policy was developed following a review of the Disability Policy in 2013. This Policy contains a DID National Action Plan that is aligned to the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) which will help guide the work of the Disability stakeholders including the Disability Centers in the Pa Enua.

Following the launch, the Pacific Disability Rights framework was facilitated by the Disability Coordination Officer of the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat, Mr. Laisiasa Merumeru & CEO of Pacific Disability Forum, Mr. Setareki Macanawai.

The Meitaki Attitude Awards is a collaboration between the Ministry of Education-Inclusive Education, the Ministry of Internal Affairs-Disability Division and the Cook Islands National Disability Council to celebrate the achievements and successes of persons with disabilities in the Cook Islands.

Led by the Ministry of Education, this was the first time that such recognition has been held for in the Cook Islands, which included a series of nominations from the community including the Pa Enua.

Pacific Disability Rights Framework

The regional delegation from the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat & the Pacific Disability Forum visited the Cook Islands in October for the Pacific Disability Rights Framework Consultation.

The Consultation was facilitated by the Disability Coordination Officer of the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat (PIFS), Mr. Laisiasa Merumeru.

There were four priorities, which the Disability stakeholders here in the Cook Islands were able to discuss, presented on, and provided feedback to the delegation.

The background of the framework goes back to the 2014 Pacific Islands Forum, where Leaders endorsed the *Framework for Pacific Regionalism*, which sets the parameters for regional cooperation and approaches, and contains the key value - *support for full inclusivity, equity and equality for all people of the Pacific* alongside the objective for *Economic growth that is inclusive and equitable.*

The promotion of equal rights for people with disability has featured prominently in Forum Leaders' annual communiqués.

The Framework for Pacific Regionalism recognises the importance of regional processes complementing national processes.

Disability has proven to be an issue that can be effectively addressed at the Pacific regional level and despite considerable differences between and among different Forum Island Countries and the vast geographical distances between them, there is much in common in regard to the situation of persons with disabilities.

This Consultation was held at the University of the South Pacific, Cook Islands Campus.
